The Tennessee RiverLine is a continuous system of outdoor recreation experiences along the Tennessee River from Knoxville, TN, to Paducah, KY, that:



Celebrates the scenic beauty, rich diversity, and storied history of the Tennessee River and the Tennessee River Valley



Connects people and communities to each other, their river heritage, and the Tennessee River landscape and



Catalyzes new investments in economic opportunity, social health, and ecological stewardship

The 652-mile Tennessee River and its nine scenic reservoirs combine to make a continuous 470,000-acre landscape that is accessible to the public, offering opportunities for canoeing, kayaking, boating, fishing, camping, and other types of water-based recreation.

Because of this continuity and public accessibility, Tennessee RiverLine is first and foremost a water trail that offers users of all ages and skill levels the opportunity to safely paddle the storied Tennessee River for an afternoon, a day, a weekend, a week, a month, or longer.

The river's banks are also home to more than 700,000 acres of National Parks, recreation areas and wildlife refuges, state and local parks, as well as diverse cities and rural communities. Each offer their own unique stories, experiences, and river access to RiverLine users while providing opportunities to paddle, hike, bike, climb, and enjoy nature as users are immersed in the beauty of the Tennessee River landscape.

When considering the river, public landscapes, and river communities as a whole, a dynamic 1.2-million-acre park suddenly comes into focus. This landscape of opportunities and experiences connected by the river is also the vision for the Tennessee RiverLine.



LETTER FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

This past year was another exciting year of milestones and progress made toward realizing the transformational vision for the Tennessee RiverLine.

In 2023, the power of partnerships provided thousands of area residents and visitors opportunities to experience the river landscape through recreation and stewardship programs, and nurtured growth in paddlesports leadership and recreation participation in underserved communities. Our Community Planning Initiative has excited the public imagination with local visions for North America's next great regional trail system in communities that would otherwise not have access to such creative capacity.

This year we also launched the Plan Your Journey toolkit that helps recreationists plan safe river experiences and showcases Tennessee River communities, and partnered with Ken Whiting to put our initiative, communities, and treasured river squarely in the international spotlight. These and many other missiondriven impacts have been celebrated through earned media that has reached an audience of more than 304 million viewers, yielding new and exciting opportunities to share our story with audiences across the country and around the world.

Above all else, what makes me the most proud is witnessing communities, organizations, and individuals from across the region come together for a common purpose. The leadership of UT Extension and our principal partners, UT Knoxville and TVA, and the collaborative effort of the expanded Tennessee RiverLine team, UT students, faculty, and staff, and hundreds of invested organizations and volunteers is what makes these impacts possible and what will continue to position us to achieve our shared goals in the future.

This is a mission in action, a vision made manifest, and we're just getting started. Together, we will continue exercising the power of partnerships to achieve our shared missions by promoting economic development and entrepreneurship, improving quality of life and public health, inspiring stewardship of natural and cultural resources, and enhancing equity of access to river spaces and experiences in Tennessee River communities.

To these ends, 2024 will be another year of mission-driven programs, investments, and growth. We are grateful to count you among our partners, and we look forward to the ongoing journey we share as a part of North America's next great regional trail system.














TENNESSEE RIVERLINE

Throughout 2023, we conducted the 652 to YOU public engagement program with new Tennessee RiverTowns Program enrollees. 652 to YOU is an opportunity for community leaders and residents to provide feedback about existing recreation experiences and infrastructure on or along the river, and share ideas for their improvement and expansion by participating in a series of interactive events and activities facilitated by our team.

At the conclusion of each 652 to YOU program, recommendations for how each community can make progress toward their aspirations related to the Tennessee RiverLine vision will be shared, and a list of potential priority projects will be identified based on each community's shared vision for their section of the Tennessee RiverLine. These projects could include new riverfront parks, campsites and access points, connective trails and greenways, and other asset-based infrastructure investments

Community Planning Initiative

Over the past two years, we conducted the Community Planning Initiative (CPI) in eligible communities enrolled in the Tennessee RiverTowns Program. This two-phase initiative concluded in the Fall of 2023, with the development of conceptual design documents for priority placemaking projects selected by local leadership as well as the facilitation of open house exhibits in each of the participating communities.

These open houses and conceptual designs are a culmination of extensive and collaborative efforts between the Tennessee RiverLine, enrolled Tennessee RiverTowns communities, and our partners at UT Knoxville, 3M, USDA Rural Development, and TVA. Community engagement and conceptual design through CPI marks an important milestone in achieving our vision and River as Park concept locally and regionally.

With conceptual design documents now developed for each of these participating communities' priority placemaking projects, the next step is to help build public support for these projects and make progress toward their implementation.

CPI was made possible by funding through the US Department of Agriculture (USDA) Rural Placemaking Innovation Challenge, as well as through the generous support of 3M Decatur with funds from the 3M Foundation, and our principal partners, UT Knoxville and Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA).



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





"Plan Your Journey" is a collection of new resources to help paddlers, boaters, anglers, and other river users plan safe and enriching Tennessee River experiences. The "Plan Your Journey" trip planning tools include an interactive web map detailing the locations and additional information about boat launches, public lands, campgrounds, outfitters, marinas, and more, along with suggested paddling trip itineraries in Tennessee River communities.

These tools have been developed to simplify the trip planning process for river users of all experience levels. For new or beginning paddlers, the "Plan Your Journey" tools build confidence in planning river experiences by consolidating hard-to-find information into a single source, while also providing information about river safety, gear lists, resource stewardship practices, and basic paddling skills.

Experienced users of the Tennessee River may discover new amenities and ideas for new paddling routes or overnight experiences by exploring the interactive web map. Boaters, anglers, and other river recreationists will also find useful information on the map about river access areas and marinas when planning their own river experiences. All mapped amenities are conveniently located within a 15-minute drive from the river's edge, making them easily accessible to Tennessee Riverline users





New Investments

Harnessing the momentum cultivated over the past several years through river recreation and stewardship initiatives, visions for reanimated river spaces and enhanced experiences are capturing the public's imagination throughout the region.

The Community Planning Initiative and 652 to YOU have given rise to conceptual designs for new boat launch areas, riverfront parks, trails, campgrounds, and other amenities. Noteworthy progress is also being achieved by allied initiatives like the Singing River Trail (AL) and Bill Dance Signature Lakes (TN). Together with community-driven planning and design efforts, the stage is being set for substantial investments in the quality of life within river communities in the foreseeable future.

A standout example is South Pittsburg's dedication to building a 16-acre riverfront park, complemented by a 5.5-mile network of connecting trails and greenways. Grant applications exceeding \$12 million were submitted for the necessary funds to implement the initial phases of this project in 2023. Abundant funding opportunities from state and federal sources for infrastructure implementation eagerly await Tennessee RiverTowns communities actively investing in their futures, guided by the support of our planning, design, and advancement teams.





The Tennessee RiverTowns program utilizes trail development and outdoor recreation as platforms for collaboration between enrolled communities and Tennessee Riverline staff to increase benefits from economic development. public health, equitable access to river experiences, and resource stewardship.

In 2023, community partners in the program organized 86 animation events. These events, tailored to outdoor recreation and stewardship, offered a commendable 14,202 participants throughout the Tennessee River Valley with new river experiences. Notably, six Tennessee RiverTowns communities initiated their involvement through active participation in 652 to YOU events, while nine communities collaborated closely with our Planning and Design Team in the creation of innovative conceptual designs for new recreation amenities. This collaborative effort underscores the commitment of Tennessee RiverTowns communities to enhancing the well-being and vibrancy of communities along the Tennessee River.

Looking Ahead to 2024

In 2024, three new communities are enrolling into the Tennessee RiverTowns Program: Calloway County, KY, Lawrence County, AL, and Dayton, TN. Those communities will begin their journey within the program, while other communities look ahead to Stage 2 of the Tennessee RiverTowns Program and trail development through the conceptual design process, moving closer to infrastructure implementation. Jennifer Webster and Nolan Wildfire joined our Programs Team at the end of 2023 as Program Managers to increase support for Tennessee RiverTowns enrollees, and we look forward to their impact and expertise shaping the growth of our programs!

Volunteerism

The effectiveness of the Tennessee RiverTowns Program, much like many of our endeavors, hinges on the dedication of volunteers who generously contribute their time and effort to the initiative. In 2023, more than 251 community members participated as volunteer members of their communities' Local Leadership Teams. In 2024, our forward-looking strategy includes enhancing the support system for these invaluable individuals. We are committed to providing expanded technical assistance, tools, and resources, fostering an environment that ensures the continued success of volunteers within our enrolled communities

The J.E.D.I. Path

Paddlesports Leadership Academy: The Paddlesports Leadership Academy (PLA) is a program created by Gerry Seavo James, Principal of The Outdoor Recreation Design Lab and Founder of Explore Kentucky, to train and mentor individuals from communities typically underserved by outdoor recreation as leaders in paddlesports. In 2023, we partnered with Gerry and Anna Levesque with Mind Body Paddle to facilitate the PLA for the second year. Participants learned multi-disciplinary paddling fundamentals, technique, risk management fundamentals, and outdoor leadership skills over the course of four days. The program included eight participants from around the region, including individuals from Tennessee, Kentucky, and Alabama representing organizations including Outdoor Afro, Black Kids Adventures, Black Women Who, Eastern Kentucky University, Centro Hispano de East TN, and the Office of Multicultural Student Life at UT Knoxville. Special instruction from previous graduates included Shawanna Kendrick, founder of Hiking Healing and Outdoors, and NaQuaina Moore, Assistant Director for UT Knoxville's Multicultural Student Life.

Grant Funding: In 2023, \$29,600 in grant funds were awarded to communities and organizational partners to support programming that fosters inclusive engagement with the Tennessee River landscape, enables diverse participation in recreation experiences, and establishes pride in and ownership of river spaces by historically underserved populations. Funding was awarded to three communities enrolled in the Tennessee RiverTowns Program, Bridgeport, AL, Chattanooga, TN, and Hardin County, TN, as well as one organizational partner, Black Kids Adventures.

The River City Company in Chattanooga, TN, partnered with The H2O Life and WaterWays to provide a series of accessible and educational events for residents of all ages. In partnership with Russell Cave National Monument and Muscle Shoals National Heritage Area, The 18th Alabama Volunteer

Regiment of Civil War Reenactors, North Alabama Canoe and Kayak, and Bridgeport's Local Leadership Team hosted a day of paddling and historical interpretation for the students of Bridgeport Middle School, Hardin County leadership partnered with Tennessee State Parks, Friends of Pickwick Landing State Park, The Hardin County Convention and Visitors Bureau, Tennessee River Museum, and the local 4-H chapter to provide underprivileged youth with the opportunity to enjoy water recreation through the educational format of the 4-H program. The Black Kids Adventures organizational grant helped to support their continued mission of inspiring black families to engage and enjoy outdoor recreation experiences together through intergenerational



The Paddlesports Leadership Academy is a program to grow diverse representation in outdoor recreation leadership. Eight participants developed paddling and outdoor leadership skills during four days of training.

Partnership Paddle

In September, our annual Partnership Paddle convened partners from diverse regions in South Pittsburg, TN, the 2022 Community Partner of the Year. Designed as a platform for cultivating collaborative relationships, the event drew the participation of 38 individuals. The program featured a warm welcome reception and a scenic paddle on the Tennessee River, spanning from South Pittsburg, TN, to Bridgeport, AL-a signature route for the community. This gathering was made possible through a collaborative effort with Lodge Cast Iron, SPARQ, and Walker Henley. It served as a momentous occasion to spotlight the South Pittsburg community and celebrate significant milestones in advancing our shared initiatives.



Living Shoreline Research

Upholding the Tennessee RiverLine's commitment to inspire new generations of stewards invested in the care of our treasured river, a partnership was formed with UT's One Health Initiative to fund research that will inform shoreline management practices across the region. Partners in the Classroom







Facing Waves

We worked with Heliconia Productions to produce an episode of Facing Waves featuring the Tennessee RiverLine, with an emphasis on Knoxville as the trailhead community. Facing Waves is an inspiring adventure travel TV series that follows world-renowned paddler and author, Ken Whiting, as he discovers the cultures, landscapes, and paddling adventures that surround the world's most amazing adventure travel destinations. Whiting has an avid following of paddling enthusiasts, so the audience is highly targeted and in alignment with our core user audience. A full-length half-hour episode was produced and began airing on national broadcast TV through Bally Sports and Outside TV in September. It has had 119 airings reaching 3.54M viewers. Shorter-form episodes called Paddle Tales were produced for distribution on YouTube. This content is evergreen and will remain on YouTube with widespread access and has already gained 89.3k viewers.





Events

Tennessee RiverTowns events, both recreation and stewardship activities, serve as dual-purpose strategies. They not only educate and engage attendees as advocates for the Tennessee RiverLine vision but also provide opportunities for recreation, celebrating the river's heritage, and fostering its health. In the 86 official Tennessee RiverTowns events this year, with over 14,000 participants, many experienced their first introduction to the Tennessee RiverLine, while all gained insights into their community's efforts to transform its relationship with the river. Additionally, our staff disseminated information about the initiative at prominent regional and national events, such as UTIA's Ag Day and the Head of the Hooch Regatta in Chattanooga, TN. These two events alone were attended by over 15,000 alumni and spectators from across the country.

Presentations

In 2023, Tennessee RiverLine staff and partners delivered presentations at various events, including the Tennessee Greenways and Trails Forum in Spencer, TN, the Ohio River Way Summit in Madison, IN, and Leadership Jackson's graduation in Scottsboro, AL. Across 21 public presentations, attended by approximately 1, 100 people, the focus was on highlighting the partners and partnerships driving the Tennessee RiverLine. The presentations not only acknowledged opportunities for future growth but also shared valuable insights gained on the journey towards establishing North America's next great regional trail system.

Stories Worth Telling

Our earned media efforts have resonated with over 304 million viewers, with a media value exceeding \$11.2 million. It is exciting to see our message amplified far and wide. The top tracking stories of the year included the announcement of the Tennessee RiverLine becoming an initiative of the University of Tennessee Institute of Agriculture which received significant pickup by national news outlets and a UTIA News story featuring the CONNECT South Pittsburg Framework Plan for South Pittsburg, TN, that was nationally broadcast on RFD-TV.





Brad Collett Appointed Tennessee RiverLine's First Executive Director

After leading the Tennessee RiverLine initiative for seven years as part of his teaching and research activity as a UT faculty member, Brad Collett was appointed Executive Director of the Tennessee RiverLine by UT Extension. This milestone allows for Brad's full-time leadership, enhancing focus on organizational and partnership development. With alignment to UT's land grant mission in outreach and economic development, the Tennessee RiverLine is part of UT Extension, contributing to a century-old legacy of improving the quality of life in Tennessee and the broader Tennessee River Valley.

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


Tennessee RiverLine Summit

For the first time since 2020, partners from river communities and organizations across the country convened in person for the 2023 Tennessee RiverLine Summit at Lake Guntersville State Park in Guntersville, AL. Commanding views over the river below set the stage for two and a half days of engaging and informative sessions for the more than 100 attendees. Supported by the first-ever presenting sponsor, BoardSafe Docks, Summit highlights included a keynote address by Carol Colleta from the Memphis River Parks Partnership, presentations by community partners sharing ideas and best practices, announcements of 2022 awards recipients, and excursions to Cathedral Caverns and Guntersville's City Harbor. Attendees also helped set the initiative's trajectory for the future through an engaging strategic planning workshop.

A Roadmap for the Future

During the Tennessee RiverLine Summit, a pivotal workshop engaged attendees in assessing the initiative's current strengths, opportunities for improvement, and future priorities. The results of this session will serve as the groundwork for a formal strategic planning process scheduled for 2024. Led by Alta Planning + Design and a nationally recognized team of experts, this process will entail extensive listening, stakeholder engagement, and reflection to define goals and strategic priorities. The aim is to sustainably advance our mission while upholding guiding principles over the next three years.

Through collaboration with neighboring Tennessee RiverTowns communities, Hardin County emphasizes the mutual benefits that result from their leadership.

Organizational Partner of the Year: UT Extension

UT Extension's strategic investment has enabled the Tennessee RiverLine to grow its multi-disciplinary team of professionals that delivers capacity to communities across the region to which they would otherwise not have access. Extension's investment has also enabled the delivery of meaningful programs that educate, inspire, and overcome barriers to river spaces and experiences. Each has set a foundation for new investments in river communities that will catalyze economic development, quality of life, and resource stewardship while accelerating the growth of the region's outdoor recreation economy. Staff from UT Extension County Offices have provided essential and stable leadership for the Tennessee RiverTowns Program where community participation may otherwise not be possible, most notably in Perry County. In Hardin County, UT Extension office is helping offer enriching educational programs for 4-H students, such as their River Rangers program, in partnership with Pickwick Landing State Park. During the summer, we partnered with UT Extension to offer fifty 4-H students and leaders the opportunity to kayak the Tennessee River during the centennial 4-H Roundup in Knoxville.

Event of the Year: Chatt Town Cool Down

This event exemplified many of the Tennessee RiverLine's guiding principles through its creative and comprehensive schedule of activities. Never before has a Tennessee RiverTowns community afforded so many attendees of a range of ages, backgrounds, and experience levels such an array of diverse and inclusive river experiences in a single event. Among the event's dozens of on and off-water activities, the H2O Life Black Women Paddle helped build camaraderie and solidarity while overcoming barriers for many first-time paddlers. The Paddle Down offered more experienced paddlers the opportunity to enjoy the Tennessee River with the city landscape as the backdrop. Integrating Chattanooga's 652 to YOU program into the event creatively engaged the community, giving attendees a voice in city recreation development and raising awareness of the broader Tennessee RiverLine initiative. The entire event was made possible by Chattanooga's Local Leadership Team, Outdoor Chattanooga, and the power of partnerships.



J.E.D.I. Path Award: Shawanna Kendrick

After meeting Shawanna Kendrick at the inaugural Paddlesports Leadership Academy, it became clear that outdoor spaces were her avenue for personal growth and healing. In 2023, exceeding Tennessee RiverTowns Program expectations, she collaborated with River City Company and Waterways in Chattanooga to organize inclusive events for all ages through the Tennessee RiverLine DEI Community Impact Grant. Shawanna's development of the Woman on Water Program, aimed at creating confident women of color as outdoor recreation ambassadors, showcased her leadership growth. From instructing at the 2023 Paddlesports Leadership Academy to leading the first-ever flat-water paddling group at Women's Paddlefest, her grace and inclusive leadership are appreciated by colleagues and friends alike.

Powered by Partnerships Award: NATR

The Powered by Partnership concept comes to life through NATR's ingenuity and initiative, driving efforts in North Alabama to enhance equitable access to outdoor recreation spaces and experiences. NATR's dedication to this shared mission took center stage at the 2023 NATR Fest, rapidly becoming a hallmark event on North Alabama's outdoor recreation calendar. Guided by the leadership of Alabama Mountains, Rivers, and Valleys RC&D, and supported by numerous partners, NATR Fest provides residents with an opportunity to explore and engage in the region's extraordinary outdoor recreation experiences. It serves not only as an avenue for individuals to learn and participate but also as a platform for allied recreation initiatives to convene, exchange successes, and collaboratively advance shared missions and priorities.

Legacy Awards: Susan Jones, Jennifer Moore, and, Madeleine Williamson

The Legacy Award recognizes individuals who have made exemplary contributions to the Tennessee RiverLine and demonstrated commitment to its guiding principles over a sustained period of time. This year, we honor Susan Jones, Jennifer Moore, and Madeleine Williamson with Legacy Awards.

Since **Susan Jones** first engaged with the Tennessee RiverLine in 2019, she has played a crucial role in effectively communicating the mission and vision of the initiative. As we transitioned from vision awareness to implementing the Tennessee RiverTowns Program, Susan consistently provided valuable insight and welcomed feedback on communication strategies and organizational goals. Susan's contributions were instrumental in navigating TVA's leadership structure to secure timely quotes, planning signature events, and crafting announcements that celebrated collective impact and achievement. Her efforts also played a key role in establishing a unified voice that amplifies the initiative's stories across the region and globally.

As a regular convener of Tennessee RiverTowns community partners in North Alabama, **Jennifer Moore** actively pursued the realization of the Tennessee RiverLine vision for Huntsville and Madison County. Jennifer consistently fostered collaboration with fellow North Alabama communities, introducing Tennessee RiverTowns Program convenings after quarterly Alabama Mountain Lakes Tourist Association meetings. Advocating at local, state, and community levels, she played a key role in establishing our relationship with the Alabama Tourism Department. Serving on the Huntsville Local Leadership Team, Jennifer's exemplary dedication and leadership during challenging times ensured the program's continuity and engagement. She also secured substantial contributions for regional destination marketing efforts and dedicated personnel for the Huntsville/Madison County Convention and Visitors Bureau to meet Tennessee RiverTowns Program requirements.

Madeleine Williamson played a pivotal role during a critical growth phase for our team. Stepping in when administrative support was limited, Madeleine led operational initiatives, researching and implementing valuable tools and procedures for the organization. Her reliability and attention to detail were evident in tasks ranging from event preparation to financial reconciliation and document editing. Madeleine tackled essential responsibilities, ensuring updated inventory and timely expense reports. She organized and streamlined processes, helping us transition from a vision to a tangible organization. This had substantial impacts on our community partners and the region.

Excellence in Stewardship: Spring City, TN

The Tennessee RiverTowns Program calls on communities to recognize their shared responsibility to steward the region's most valuable natural and cultural resource through stewardship events. Each community can design stewardship experiences that are place-based and partner-driven, enabling participants to learn about and engage with a community's unique stewardship priorities. Spring City's continued partnership with Arrowhead Resort and Responsible Stewardship to provide numerous clean-up opportunities for the community is an exemplary and innovative demonstration of this intention. Their efforts champion the community's love for the Tennessee River, a desire to conserve it for future generations, and the commitment to create new and younger generations of stewards.



Excellence in Recreation: Bridgeport, TN

Bridgeport's community efforts to engage youth in paddlesports activities this year have demonstrated a commitment to expanding river users in the area. The initiatives showcase that the Tennessee River is an accessible recreation amenity that improves the quality of life and public health in Bridgeport. As recipients of the DEI Community Impact Grant, the Local Leadership Team in Bridgeport dedicated time and effort to implementing essential risk management and participant safety measures. This focused effort aimed to make rivers accessible to middle school students who lack their own paddling equipment or do not have easy access to such river experiences. Thanks to their hard work, the events empowered youth to feel welcomed and confident when accessing river spaces and experiences.

Extra Mile Awards

In 2023, 251 volunteer members of 20 Tennessee RiverTowns Local Leadership Teams organized river animation and stewardship events, advocacy efforts, and other initiatives to raise awareness of the Tennessee RiverLine vision and facilitate community engagement in its realization.
